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WHY AWARDS?

Purpose

The purpose of an award in 4-H Club work is two-fold:

1. To help motivate members to gain certain skills and knowledge.
2. To recognize their achievements

Recognition is basic human need – and a sense of personal importance is particularly important to youth.

Recognition can take many forms – awards being only a part of the recognition that should be given to your 4-H members. Day-by-day recognition of all club members is essential to a satisfying 4-H club experience and to the development of each boy and girl. Pats on the back, or a simple thank-you; they may not appear important to you, but for the club member they can be a real boost. Giving a member some leadership responsibility or asking for assistance in planning programs helps he/she gain that feeling of personal importance.

The Awards System

The 4-H awards program here in B.C. is designed to allow each club member the opportunity to earn an award for his/her efforts. All who achieve are recognized – not just the top few.

It is important that you, as club leaders, understand what awards are available and the requirements for obtaining each. You can make certain that award recognition is given to a member as a result of a genuine effort on his/her part.

The awards program includes badges, certificates, ribbons, pins, trips, and scholarships.

- * Briefly, junior members receive recognition for mastering certain skills in the form of badges. A mark of 60% is necessary to earn a badge.
- ** A 60% mark on a Junior Proficiency exam entitles a member to a Junior Proficiency certificate.
- *** Senior members are eligible for senior skill certificates upon obtaining a mark of 75%.

RECORD KEEPING

Purpose

If a 4-H leader is to use the 4-H Awards Program as a “tool” to motivate young people, some method of record keeping of a member’s progress is necessary. The key to successful use and understanding of 4-H awards is keeping accurate records, which is the responsibility of all 4-H members and leaders.

The following options are available to assist leaders and members:

4-H member: 4-H Member Personal Achievement Record Book #118.

4-H leader: 4-H Leader’s Record Book #113, and/or 4-H Member Award Cards #125.

In addition, 4-H Member Award Cards will be kept by District Awards Coordinators as a back-up to leader and member records.

JUNIOR AWARDS

Introduction

Junior 4-H members completing required skills receive badges. The following criteria are used:

1. 60% is required in order to receive a badge.
2. A member will receive a badge only once.
3. Project badges only for members currently enrolled in that project.

NOTE: *Members have four years to obtain several badges so standards should be high enough to spread awarding of badges over four years.*

ACHIEVEMENT

Purpose

Achievement certificates (Publication #350) are awarded on the basis of work done by the club member throughout the entire year. Scoring is done by the club leader and/or designated person. Those members receiving “satisfactory” in all three areas will be awarded an Achievement Certificate.

MANAGEMENT OF PROJECT

An inspection by club leader or designated person to determine the “manner in which the project work is progressing”.

During the year 4-H members will learn about the preparation and care of their project. For livestock clubs this is called “husbandry” and for non-livestock clubs it varies (i.e. display). This is one of the skills learned in 4-H that builds knowledge and responsibility in 4-H members.

COMPLETION OF PROJECT

A member must exhibit his/her completed project at Achievement Day.

Another important skill is “showmanship”, or the ability to show or tell others about the project or what has been learned through the project work over the year.

COMPLETION OF RECORD BOOK

A member must satisfactorily complete a project record book and turn it in to the club leader. Completion of the record book for each project is necessary to build skills in the areas of goal setting, record keeping and budgeting.

PROFICIENCY CERTIFICATE

Purpose

A *Proficiency Certificate* (Publication #250) is an indication that a 4-H member has a complete working knowledge of Junior 4-H work. It is a privilege to write a Junior Proficiency exam: a privilege given by the Leader when he/she feels a member has a complete working knowledge in project work, including Public Speaking, Demonstrations, Judging, etc. The Junior Proficiency exam is a closed book exam.

Requirements to Write

- Any time following a member’s thirteenth birthday.
- The member must have earned two badges.

Questions and Answers

Proficiency Master Guide of questions and answers are available for each Project for **4-H leaders only**. This is the basic requirement only. Project information in 4-H manuals, etc., should also be studied.

Exams

Leaders are to make up exams and mark them, based on Master Guides of questions and answers, and sample exams available from Key Leaders or on the B.C. 4-H website (Leaders Secured Site). The exam should include general 4-H knowledge questions 20/100 which include questions from the 4-H pledge, to 4-H Club Executive duties, to naming local 4-H and agriculture dignitaries for example. The second part is specific project knowledge questions 80/100, as well as questions that test the member’s complete working knowledge of their 4-H project. A score of 60% is required to pass. ***Submit marks and/or market tests to the DISTRICT 4-H AWARDS CO-ORDINATOR for certificate.*** The exam is a closed

book exam and may take the form of an oral discussion between the member and leader if a leader feels that it would be more appropriate for the member's learning style.

Junior Proficiency Deadline

To enrol as a Senior member, a member must write his/her proficiency exam prior to December 31st of the previous year. *Leaders must submit results to the DISTRICT 4-H AWARDS CO-ORDINATOR within a week of December 31st. DISTRICT 4-H AWARDS CO-ORDINATORS should check with all District 'A' Leaders to collect the Junior Proficiency scores within one week of the deadline.*

A member who writes his/her proficiency exam after December 31st **completes** the year as a Junior and is eligible to receive Senior Skill Certificates and privileges of the senior 4-H program **the following year**.

Exceptions

1. Members starting after 13th birthday:

It is recommended that members starting 4-H after their 13th birthday work in 4-H for **one year** prior to writing their Proficiency exam or follow the following guidelines: Members starting the Project after their 13th birthday may, at the discretion of the leader, write their Junior Proficiency exam without first obtaining two badges if they have a **complete working knowledge** of the junior work in the project. Public Speaking, Demonstration, Judging, knowledge and skills are considered part of this working knowledge as well as specific project work.

2. Transferring Members:

Senior members transferring between projects may write the Junior Proficiency exam in the new project as soon as the leader feels they are ready and continue with senior work, provided #1 above applies.

The Junior Proficiency exam must be written prior to **December 31st** of the previous year to be eligible as a senior member in the project during the following year, e.g., to obtain Project Senior Skill certificates and to be eligible to participate in the Provincial 4-H Programs.

Reasons for a member to obtain a Junior Proficiency Certificate

A member requires a Junior Proficiency Certificate to participate in the following 4-H Programs:

1. Provincial 4-H Public Speaking
2. Provincial 4-H Demonstrations (one team member)
3. District 4-H Junior Council Membership
4. 4-H Youth Action/ Food for Thought
5. Provincial 4-H Club Week/Agri-Career Quest
6. External 4-H grade 11 and 12 High school Credit courses

NOTE: Advice to 4-H Leaders and 4-H Key Leaders

Exceptions #1 and #2 **should** cover most examples of potential questions related to Junior Proficiency. Any additional "grey" areas of interpretation may be worked out by a 4-H club leader with advice of 4-H key leaders, if required, keeping in mind the following points:

*Maximize flexibility to fit particular situation of member.

*To not "take away" from the purpose of the Junior Proficiency exam and certificate in relation to standards in your 4-H club and between 4-H clubs.

SENIOR AWARDS

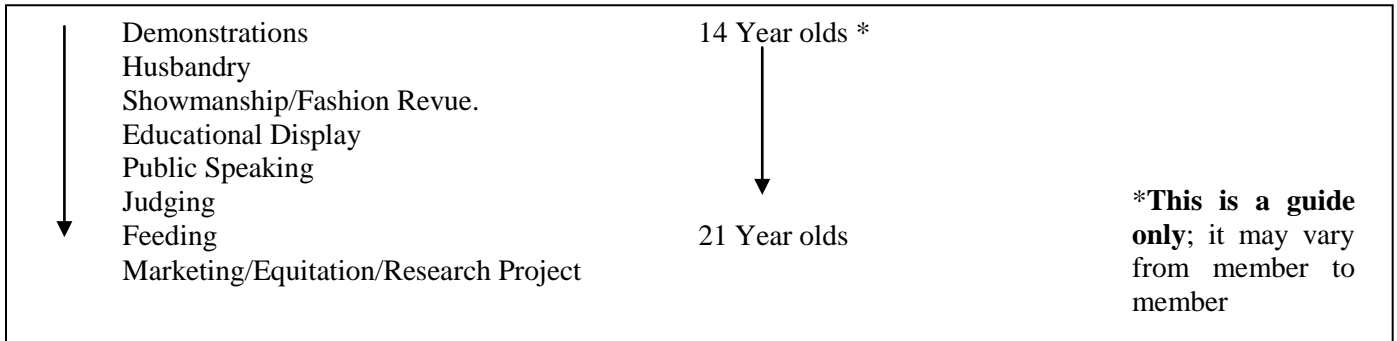
Introduction

Senior 4-H members completing required skills receive certificates. The following criteria are used:



1. 75% required to receive a certificate.
2. A member will receive a certificate only once.
3. Project certificates are only for members currently enrolled in that Project.
4. A member may begin to receive certificates in the first complete 4-H year after becoming a Senior member, i.e., Junior Proficiency written prior to December 31st of the previous year.

4-H members should have a complete working knowledge of the skill area prior to being awarded, and/or writing a Senior Skill exam. The following guide is suggested to assist a Senior member in planning their Senior skill work:



PROGRAM SKILLS

1. Public Speaking

- *5-7 minute speech, plus 1-2 minute impromptu
- see *Public Speaking Score Card* (Publication # 148E) and *Public Speaking Impromptu Score Card* (Publication #148P)
- Club, District or Regional Public Speaking
- * 75% score on impromptu speech plus 75% score on 5-7 minute speech (not necessarily in the same year) qualifies member for Senior Skill Certificate.

2. Demonstration

- team of two
- 8-10 minutes

- Club, District and Regional 4-H Demonstrations

3. Educational Display

- Credit can be given to a single person, team of 2, or one person in charge of the creation of the display (ie. Educational Display Committee Chairperson)

4. Provincial Program

3. Safety Judging

4. Planning of Safety Workshops

One member will organize a safety day workshop for their Club, District, or Region. This day could include guest speakers from the local community, FARSHA, WorkSafe BC, or another appropriate speaker. Topics could include Animal Handling, Barnyard Safety, Proper ATV Use, or other topics related to home and farm safety. The member will complete a written thorough summary of the safety workshop including a brief summary of each presentation and safety tips learned for distribution to the Club and to the Youth Development Specialist.

Completed Project will be approved by the Club Leaders and the topic from the appropriate month will be presented at the beginning of each Club meeting. The year-long plan will be marked by Youth Development staff.

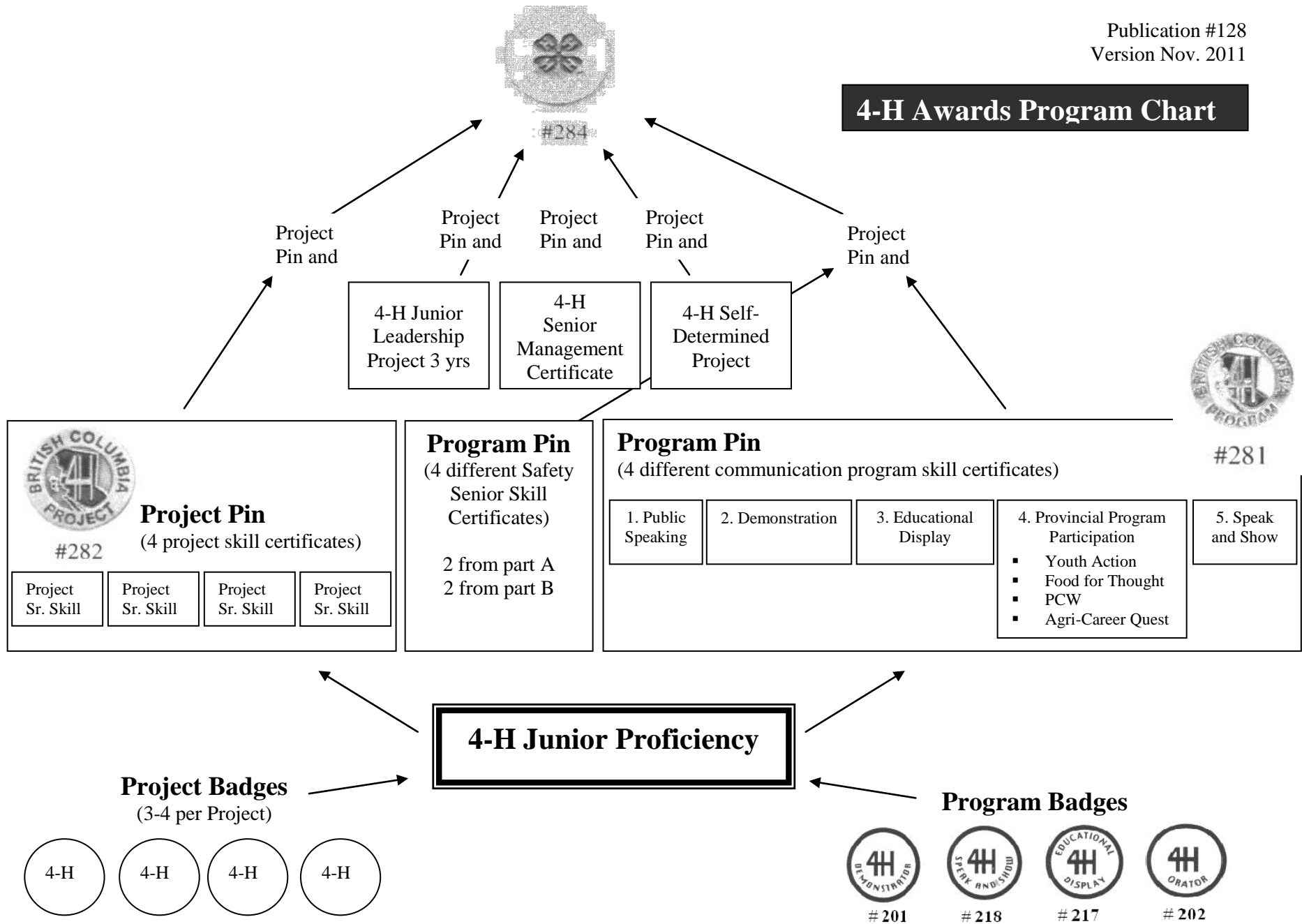

- Two project pins; e.g., four Senior Skill Certificates in Clothing Plus four in Beef (any two project combinations are eligible); OR
- One project pin plus one Program pin; OR
- One project pin plus one Senior Management Certificate; OR
- One Project pin plus one Self-Determined Project Certificate; OR
- One Project pin plus three years of Junior Leadership

EXTERNAL 4-H GRADES 11 & 12 COURSE INFORMATION

A B.C. Ministry of Education accepted External Course is a Ministry authorized course developed or offered outside the British Columbia School System. Students receive course credit towards graduation for successfully completing an External Course. The External 4-H Grade 11 and 12 courses are of equivalent standard to other Ministry authorized senior secondary courses. The 4-H course can only be earned through membership and completion of requirements in the 4-H program. The end credit could be:

External 4-H 11

A. Project Pin Certification **4 Credits**
Applied Skills
OR B. Program Pin Certification Applied Skills

External 4-H 12

4 Credits
Honour Club Pin Certification Applied Skills

A. Project Pin Certification Requirements for External 4-H Grade 11 Credit:

To achieve a Project pin, Senior 4-H members must enrol in a designated Project following the completion of their Junior Proficiency certificate and receive four Senior Skill certificates in that Project area.

The four Senior Skill exams are both written and practical with 75% required to pass the exams. Senior Skill requirements are as outlined in this publication in each Project heading.

The written exams are available from the B.C. 4-H Provincial Office.

B. Program Pin Certification Requirements for 4-H Grade 11 Credit:

Senior 4-H members enrolled in 4-H Clubs may present speeches, demonstrations, learn safety skills, prepare educational displays, and attend 4-H Youth Action, or Agri-Career Quest, or Food for Thought, and/or 4-H Provincial Club Week.

To complete Program certification, members must submit four certificates (maximum of one each of numbers 1. to 5. or four from 6.) to their District 4-H Awards Co-ordinator:

1. Public Speaking Senior Skill Certificate with a score over 75%
2. Demonstration Senior Skill Certificate with a score over 75%
3. Educational Display Senior Skill Certificate with a score over 75%
4. One provincial 4-H Conference Participation Certificate from 4-H Youth Action, 4-H Food for Thought, Agri-Career Quest, or 4-H Provincial Club Week
5. Speak and Show Senior Skill Certificate with a score over 75%
6. Four different Safety Senior Skill Certificates (two from part A and two from part B) each with a score over 75%

Honour Pin Certification Requirements and External 4-H Grade 12 Credit:

1. Two Project Pins; or
2. One Project Pin plus three years of 4-H Junior Leadership; or
3. One Project Pin plus one Senior Management Certificate; or
4. One Project Pin plus one Self-Determined Project Certificate; or
5. One Project Pin Certificate (A) plus one Program Pin Certificate (B)

Administration & Documentation for 4-H External Grades 11 & 12

All Project Pin and Program Pin Certification and Honour Club Pins are obtained by 4-H members through the regular Senior Skill exams and certificates of the B.C. 4-H Award Opportunities.

Once members have completed the requirements for either External 4-H 11 or External 4-H 12 course credit they can request the certificate necessary to present to their school through their District 4-H Awards Coordinator as follows:

1. 4-H member must present the 4-H Senior Skill or other certificates that verify completion of the requirements of the course to the District 4-H Awards Coordinator.
2. 4-H Awards Coordinator will send a copy of the member's award card (with 4-H member's home address) and with the necessary requirements for the course on it (already verified) to the B.C. 4-H Office at 2743 – 30th Street, Vernon, B.C. V1T 5C6.
3. Youth Development Assistant will issue Official Certificate with one of the following three titles; include the student's name, Program requirements, mark in percentage, verification signature and date.
 - 4-H Project Pin Certification
 - 4-H Program Pin Certification
 - 4-H Honour Pin Certification.
4. 4-H member will receive the 4-H Program Pin Certification, 4-H Project Pin Certification, or 4-H Honour Club Pin Certification directly to their home address.
5. 4-H member has responsibility to take the certificate to their school counsellor to receive the course credit.

The 4-H grading system is: **A 86-100%** **B 75-85%**

The school must decide whether to report the student's level of achievement as a school percent and letter grade, or as a Transfer Standing (TS) letter grade. TS have no negative or positive impact on a student's Grade Point Average (GPA).
